

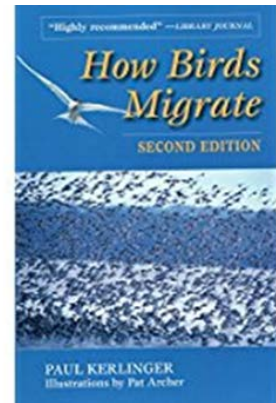

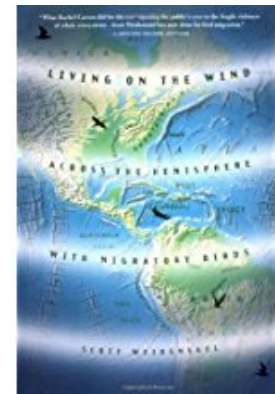
- **How Birds Migrate.** Paul Kerlinger with illustrations by Pat Archer. Second edition. 2009. Stackpole Books. 225 pages.

- **Living on the Wind: Across the Hemisphere with Migratory Birds.** By Scott Weidensaul. 1999. North Point Press. New York. 403 pages.

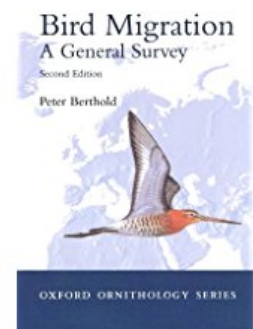

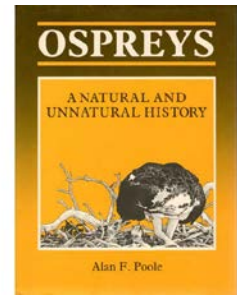
- **Bird Migration: A General Survey.** Peter Berthold. 2001. Oxford Univ. Press.

*A bit more technical and somewhat dated, but remains a valuable source.*



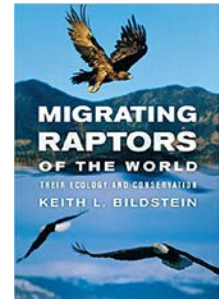
**Ospreys: A Natural and Unnatural History.** Alan Poole. 1989. Cambridge University Press.

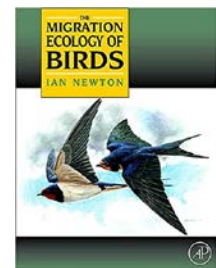
- **Migrating Raptors of the World: Their Ecology and Conservation.** Keith L. Bildstein. 2006. Cornell Univ. Press.
